

## THE HONORABLE FRANK PACE, JR.

was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, on 5 July 1912; attended local schools and then the Hill School, Pottstown, Pennsylvania; graduated from Princeton University, 1933; received a degree from Harvard University, 1936; was admitted to the Arkansas bar and practiced law there, 1936–1942; was assistant district attorney of the Twelfth Judicial District, 1936–1938; was general attorney, Arkansas Revenue Department, 1938–1940; married Margaret Janney, 1940; entered the Army as a second lieutenant, 1942; served in the Air Transport Command, Army Air Corps, and emerged as a major, 1945; was a special

assistant to the Attorney General, U.S. Taxation Division, 1946; was executive assistant to the Postmaster General, 1946–1948; was assistant director, 1948, then director, 1949–1950, of the Bureau of the Budget; served as Secretary of the Army, 12 April 1950–20 January 1953; executed the structural and functional changes mandated by the Army Organization Act of 1950 and headed the Army during the Korean War, 1950–1953; implemented policies to broaden the Army's use of Black manpower; elevated research and development to the Deputy Chief of Staff level; was chairman of the Defense Ministers Conference, North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), 1950; was chairman of the American Council of NATO, 1957–1960; was vice chairman, President's Commission Board, 1961–1973; was chairman of the board, Corporation for Public Broadcasting, 1968–1972; was a member and past president of the National Institute of Social Sciences and a member of the Brookings Institution; died in Greenwich, Connecticut, on 8 January 1988.



## DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY PACE AWARD

Named after former Secretary of the Army The Honorable Frank Pace, Jr., the Pace Award has been presented annually since 1962 to one Army officer, lieutenant colonel or below, and one civilian employee, GS-14 equivalent or below, assigned in a staff capacity to Headquarters, Department of the Army, for a contribution of outstanding significance to the Army that culminated during the calendar year. Awardees are selected based on their performance and completion of significant staff assignments that benefit the Army by providing substantial financial savings, or technological or military development.

## CIVILIAN RECIPIENT OF THE PACE AWARD

**MICHAEL R. WILSON**

*Logistics Management Specialist  
Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4*

For his significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2013 as a Logistics Management Specialist, Secondary Items Division, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4. Mr. Wilson's performance was a major contributing factor in safeguarding seamless support to deployed Soldiers, finding efficiencies to reduce or avoid costs, and ensuring the equipment readiness of the force. His efforts overseeing the redistribution of Army-owned repair parts within Afghanistan resulted in a cost avoidance of from \$3 to \$6 million in secondary destination transportation costs each month during 2013 and more than \$141 million over the life of the program. He was instrumental in establishing guidance on the management of serviceable returns across the Army, and he led efforts to streamline the shipping and handling process for turn-in for disposal. Mr. Wilson's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of government service and are a great credit to him, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4 and the Department of the Army.

## MILITARY RECIPIENT OF THE PACE AWARD

**CAPTAIN LAUREN M. HAMLIN**

*Assistant Executive Officer and

Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1*

For her significant contributions to the Department of the Army during calendar year 2013 as Assistant Executive Officer and Chief of Administration and Support, Comprehensive Soldier and Family Fitness (CSF2) Program, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1. Captain Hamlin developed and implemented cost-saving strategies on multiple Army contracts that saved the Army more than \$14.7 million. She also singlehandedly developed the capability for CSF2 Training Center managers and program managers Armywide to order training and information materials online, partnering with the Defense Logistics Agency to save more than \$880,000. Her impressive ability to streamline processes and reduce costs contributed significantly to the Army's overall efforts to synchronize programs and reduce redundancy within the Ready and Resilient Campaign Plan. Captain Hamlin's outstanding accomplishments are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and are a great credit to her, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-1 and the Department of the Army.



## THE HONORABLE BRAD R. CARSON



Mr. Brad R. Carson was sworn in as the 31st Under Secretary of the Army on March 27th, 2014 and assumed duties as the Army's Chief Management Officer (CMO).

Under Secretary Carson previously served as the 20th General Counsel of the Department of the Army. In that capacity he was the primary legal advisor to the Secretary of the Army and the Chief Legal Officer for the United States Army. In addition, he was the Army's Designated Agency Ethics Official and was responsible for management and oversight of the worldwide Army Ethics Program.

Mr. Carson attended Jenks High School in Jenks, Oklahoma, and Baylor University, where he graduated with honors and was selected as a Rhodes Scholar. Studying at Trinity College, the University of Oxford, he earned a Bachelor of Arts/Master of Arts in Politics, Philosophy, and Economics, and, in 1994, he received his law degree from the University of Oklahoma College of Law, where he was recognized as the Outstanding Graduate.

Since his graduation from law school, Mr. Carson has held a variety of professional positions in both the private and public sectors. Before entering politics, he practiced commercial law at Crowe & Dunlevy, P.C., the largest law firm in the state of Oklahoma. In 2000, he represented the 2nd District of Oklahoma in the United States House of Representatives. After leaving office in 2004, Mr. Carson was a fellow at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and, later, Chief Executive Officer of Cherokee Nation Businesses, L.L.C.

From 2009 to 2010, Mr. Carson served on active military duty as a United States Navy officer deployed to Iraq, embedded with the United States Army's 84th Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Battalion. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his service as an intelligence officer working with EOD teams at seven bases investigating bomb sites, caches, smuggling routes and other activities related to improvised explosive devices.

Under Secretary Carson also served as professor of business law at the University of Tulsa, where he had a joint appointment in the College of Law and the College of Business and was the Director of the National Energy Policy Institute at the University of Tulsa. He's also been a contributor to the Weekly Standard, Blueprint, The New Republic, and Democracy: A Journal of Ideas.

Mr. Carson is married with one child and is an enrolled tribal member of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma.
